We advise use of public transport wherever possible. Edinburgh is very busy during August and parking options are limited. There are multi-storey car parks and metered parking throughout the city centre.



Accessibility

The RSE has the following facilities available for visitors with disabilities:

Wheelchair Access with or without assistance

A ramped access for wheelchair users is located at 26 George Street. Please ring the bell to alert Reception to your presence or, alternatively, ring 0131 240 5000 for access.

If you have mobility impairment difficulties but are able to go up some steps, the building's main entrance is via 22 George Street. Rails are available on both sides of the staircase (five steps).

Lift: The main passenger lift accommodates a powered wheelchair, which will enable access to most Society Rooms. Visitors using smaller wheelchairs can also gain access to the Kelvin and Wellcome West rooms via the smaller lift.

If your wheelchair is wider than 76cm, please contact the Venue Manager for further guidance on access and dimensions in the building.

The RSE has its own wheelchair, which visitors can use when appropriate. For example, in the case that a person's wheelchair is too wide, we can offer the choice to be transferred to the RSE wheelchair. This wheelchair is available to book in advance.

Should you wish to transfer from your wheelchair into a standard seat, please do let us know.

All rooms in the building are wheelchair accessible, except for the Lower Gallery.

Accessible toilet

A unisex disabled toilet is available on the Ground Floor, beside the main lift.

Parking

There is no disabled parking space available on George Street, but taxis and cars may pull and park for a short period of time in front of the entrance of the building.

Facilities for people with visual impairment

Assistance dogs welcome. Guide dogs are welcome throughout the building.

Seats are normally not allocated, but if you attend an event in the Lecture Theatre and wish to seat at the aisle, please contact us for provisions to be made.

Facilities for people with hearing impairment

Hearing loop – an induction loop is fitted in the Wolfson Lecture Theatre. Please remember to use the "T" switch on hearing aids. A mobile system is available at Reception for oneon-one activities.

Low lighting

There is dim lighting available in the Wolfson Lecture Theatre, the Wellcome Rooms, the Scott Room and the Kelvin Room.

The RSE will also take all reasonable steps to provide additional facilities and assistance. If required, please do not hesitate to contact RSE staff through RSE Reception.
